In 2014, IDHS began the implementation of the Differential Response system. In 2016, a rule change broadened the criteria for acceptance of sexual abuse cases to include anyone living in the home. In 2017, a rule change included a new category of "Dangerous Substances" used, manufactured, possessed or distributed in a child's environment, even if a child is not home. Meth category was expanded to additional illegal substances.</p> <p>All of the ECI LR funded programs help to prevent child abuse by offering support and decreasing stress in homes and child care environments.</p>
